Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I have never been a person who has made New Year's resolutions. I do not seem to have the kind of internal discipline that is needed to enact dramatic changes in my life. Motivation to change things in my life has had to come from the outside. For instance, I did not begin to exercise regularly because of some sort of promise I made on New Year's Eve. I began to work out because I had developed back problems. As long as I worked out regularly, my back didn't hurt. Pain (or the promise of a lack of pain) is a great motivator.

One of the aspects of 2016 that was painful for me was the divisive way that we, as a nation, often spoke to each other or spoke about each other. All throughout the 2015-2016 presidential campaign the dialogue between the candidates had precious little to do with the ideas and policies that were important to the American people. We allowed the dialogue to devolve into personal attacks on the candidates which, after a while, became attacks on those who supported the candidates. When the dust settled and the results of the elections were revealed, we were left more entrenched and embittered than ever.

The way that we speak about each other not only reflects the conditions of our hearts, it shapes our hearts as well. To consistently speak badly of someone or to constantly question the motivations behind every action or word is a very dark rabbit hole to enter in to. This habit can become a dark spirit that has the ability to spill into more than just the political field; it can affect all of our relationships.

I do not pretend to have a solution for our country's ills, but God has given *me* something that I can do. The Eighth Commandment states, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor" (Exodus 20:16). This commandment means more than just not lying. Martin Luther, in the *Small Catechism*, explains the meaning as this, *"We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or de-stroy their reputations. INSTEAD we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light." In other words, God's Eighth Commandment challenges me to do more than just tell the truth. It challenges me to try to give the other the benefit of the doubt – even if I do not agree with them or even like them. It challenges me to try to assume that – for the overwhelming majority of the people - the other has the best interests of the nation (or me) at heart. I do not have to agree with what is said or done, but - if I am called to respond - I am called to address (correct, admonish, confront) the word or act and not to attack the person who says or does it.*

Mahatma Gandhi was once attributed to have said, "Be the change that you want to see in this world." I want to see a new and civil way to dialogue about important things in this nation. Therefore I feel called to change the way I speak to (and ultimately think about) those who may not agree with me. Is it easy? No. A change of habits rarely is. But the alternative hurts me too much. Pain is a great motivator.

God's blessings for this new year.

Greetings and Joy to you and your families as we begin the 2017 year,

Last month I reflected on the ways in which God has been at work through our youth ministry. This month I look forward to 2017 and the ways that God will continue to use our ministry here to reach youth in the Lockport area.

We are continuing to discern the direction of developing our high school ministries. We are looking to start a group that will meet bi-weekly to discuss the connection between social justice issues and our faith. During each study we will include hands on elements where we do community service and explore opportunities to put our faith into practice. We hope to develop a group that is an inviting environment for all youth, whether they have a long relationship with Christ or are just curious.

We also are looking to continue to expand on our existing programs. Last year we took

four youth to a mission trip to Hamilton Ohio, the youth who came had a blast working on homes of residents along with 400 other youth from across the country. This year we have 8 spots for youth. Youth who have at least completed senior year are eligible.

We also look forward to our third summer of F5, our summer ministry for middle school and high school aged youth. This summer we hope to continue to provide activities, service projects, and Bible studies for our youth each week. We have seen growth in the number of youth that have participated over the last two years. Our goal for 2016 is to expand the number of adults who volunteer to help so that we can continue to expand the activities and service projects.

This fall marks the completion of a transition that our Confirmation program has been in over the past three years. This fall we will confirm a group of students on Reformation Sunday. We have enjoyed the walk with these boys and girls over the past three years, but it does not stop there. We hope to continue to provide opportunities for them to express and grow their faith. Our responsibility as a congregation to the nurturing of their faith does not stop when they are confirmed.

We have a great group of volunteers for a number of ministries including tutoring, VBS, and Sunday school. In 2017 we hope to expand our bank of volunteers, this will allow our existing ministries to grow as well as to continue to plan and develop further ministries as we see needs in our community. This includes developing a youth committee who would meet monthly to evaluate and discern youth programming.

Altar Guild is a ministry at Shepherd of the Hill that serves God in His house. We are usually work-



Shepherd of the Hill Lutheran Church Council Minutes Tuesday, December 13, 2016

The meeting was called to order by President Steve Kirk at 6:35 PM.

Present: Dave Helfert, Dennis Wellsandt, Ken Franz, Rick McManis, Steve Kirk, Pastor Jon Pedersen, Phil Sleezer, Fern Kinder, Nell Pieper and Tom Gustafson.

The Council shared personal "highs/lows" and prayed for one another.

Minutes of the November 15 meeting were approved prior to the meeting via email.

Treasurer's Report: Due to a combination of circumstances, there was no treasurer's report available for the month of November.

Treasurer Wellsandt told Council that at the conclusion of the 2016 budget year, he would prepare a report that would show how expenditures for 2016 compare with what had been budgeted.

Pastor's Report (Highlights):

A "Family Fun Night" will take place following the Saturday evening service on January 21. It will include a baked potato bar and Bunco!

From February 1-8, Pastor and Sonya will be taking a vacation/ministry trip to Nicaragua.

Youth Ministers Report: Council received a written report from Mike Markwell documenting recent and future youth events. He also included fund raising goals for 2017.

President's Mailbox:

Our congregation received a letter from Pastor Kurt Nordby (Assistant to the Bishop for Stewardship and Development). Pastor Nordby thanked us for our "faithfulness and generosity in sharing gifts of mission support ... Because of your gifts we remain strong and bold in the telling of all God's wonderful works and grace in Christ Jesus."

Ministry Team Reports:

Communications (Tom Gustafson): No recommendations to Council

<u>Evangelism/Fellowship and Caring</u> (Ken Franz): This committee is being "reformatted" ... its goals/purposes being reevaluated. The Befriender's Ministry will play a role in this repurposing.

Stewardship (Pastor Pedersen): The pledge cycle for ministry in 2017 has been completed.

Learning and Youth (Rick McManis): The youth will be helping with the "Family Fun Night" planned for January.

The original order of sixty 50th Anniversary Cookbooks sold out quickly. Another 60 were ordered.

Preschool (Nell Pieper): A new buzzer/alarm system is being installed.

Preschool registration is now taking place.

There will be a \$7.00 increase in future tuition.

The Ministry Team Assessment was completed and shared by Nell with Council.

<u>Property</u> (Phil Sleezer): A committee to examine our HVAC system has been formed. Eventually this committee will come to Council with recommendations ...what needs to be done, when does it need to be done, and how should it be paid for. Jim Naylor is the coordinator of this committee. Other members are Terry Ziemke, Bob Barwa and Max Woods.

Phil Sleezer will contact the 20/10 Engineering Group and request an invoice for their HVAC evaluation that was submitted to SOTH in September of 2016.

Worship (Pastor Pedersen): No recommendations to Council.

Congregational Ministry Teams:

<u>Finance/Audit</u> (Dennis Wellsandt): In November, Teasurer Wellsandt (and Lois Reil) attended a treasurer's workshop. A CPA (Thomas Hammar) at this workshop strongly suggested that statements of giving that are distributed annually to church members should include the following statement. (The reasons are IRS related.)

"No goods or services were provided to you by the church in connection with any contributions and consists of entirely intangible spiritual benefits."

Treasurer Wellsandt made a motion that Shepherd of the Hill follow this protocol (2nd by Tom Gustafson). The motion carried.

CPA Hammar also recommended an annual audit and that a Form 1099 be provided to anyone who is paid more than \$600 in a calendar year.

Memorial Gifts (Nell Pieper): New carpeting for the narthex has been chosen.

Nell shared with Council the Ministry Assessment completed by the Memorial Gifts Committee.

Personnel (Dave Helfert): No recommendations to Council.

<u>Nominations</u> (Fern Kinder): Preparing for elections in January is still "a work in progress." It is difficult to "get a handle" on all elected positions ... including length of terms and how many are elected each year. Rick McManis agreed to attempt to clear up this confusion.

Old Business:

<u>10:35 service</u> ... Pastor will prepare a survey to share with the attendees of the 10:35 service to see if that service time is working.

<u>Endowment Committee update</u>: The committee is looking at organizations that will help us with the basics of setting up an endowment as well as future help in administering the fund. Two organizations that have been considered are In Faith (associated with Thrivent) and ELCA.

Build<u>ing key distribution</u>: Dawn Virva has completed a master list of building key distribution.

New Business:

<u>Council pictures</u>: Photos will be taken in January after the election.

<u>Weight Watchers request for room use</u>: Weight Watchers has requested to rent a room for weekly meetings (probably Tuesdays). After a motion by Ken Franz (2nd by Nell Pieper), Council approved this rental agreement.

Nell Pieper made a motion for adjournment (seconded by Dave Helfert). The meeting was adjourned at 8:54 and was closed with the Lord's Prayer.


