Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an account of the hope that is in you. (1 Peter 3:15)

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This upcoming Sunday (November 5) we will have the wonderful privilege of watching eight of our ninth graders confirm their baptismal faith before the congregation. When these young people were baptized, they were just infants and the questions that were asked by the pastor were directed at the parents and sponsors. Now is the time when our confirmands are called to answer those same questions:

Do you renounce the ways of sin that draw you from God?

Do you believe in God the Father?

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

These fantastic youth have also worked hard to prepare a written statement about their faith in God and they will read it as part of this Sunday's worship service. As Peter wrote in his New Testament letter (look above), Caity, Aiden, Abby, Chloe, Nolan, Paige, Zach, and Andrew have made ready their "defense to anyone who demands from [them] an account of the hope within them."

I believe that this is not just a job for our recent confirmands; this is a challenge for each one of us. Are we ready to make an account of the hope that is found in us? When someone asks us where we see God in motion in our lives, are we ready to answer? In 2015, New Life Lutheran Church in Bolingbrook began a year-long project that recruited forty people to write a testimony that shared where they saw Christ in motion in their lives. The testimonies were collected and published for the congregation's use as an Advent devotional. In addition to this, each of the people who contributed to this project shared their particular testimonies with the congregation over the course of forty weeks. If you would like to see a Youtube of one of these testimonies, they are available through the website of New Life Lutheran Church, Bolingbrook (http://www.newlifebolingbrook.org). Just 'click' the box that says "Christ in Motion: Telling the Stories, Celebrating the Gifts."

What am I asking from you? Volunteer to share your testimony in writing about where you have seen and are seeing Christ in motion in your own life.

Who can participate? It doesn't matter if you have been part of this congregation for only two weeks or your entire life. It doesn't matter if you are eight years old or eighty. It doesn't matter if you are only in third grade or have a PhD. We want to hear your stories.

How can you begin? Focus on these three questions:

- 1. In what ways have you seen Christ in motion in your life in the past? Don't just list them, but tell a story around them.
- 2. In what ways do you believe that you have been called to do God's work in your family, work, community, and/or church? Each of us are in a particular chapter in our lives that shapes what God is calling you to do and be.
- 3. Where can you identify Christ in motion in your life right now? Use the answers of the previous questions to shape this.

When do I need it? We would like to have all of the stories by December 20 which will give us enough time to edit and compile so that they will be available for Lent, 2018.

Intrigued? Good – let me know – pastor.jon.pedersen@gmail.com. If our confirmands can write their faith stories and defend the hope that they have within them, so can you.


This past month we celebrated the 1st communion of five students. There are a few things that I get to witness in teaching the class that bring me joy. Students are typically



Worship: Saturday, November 11 5:00 p.m. Followed by a simple Sabbath meal*



Hey All,

OUR NEXT 24-HOUR DEEP BREATH IN-HOME RETREAT WILL BE SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 11 THROUGH SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 12.

One of the reasons we are hosting this event is to help people experience Sabbath time in your own ordinary life. To that end, we invite you to block out a full, 24-hour day beginning at 5 pm Saturday, November 11 until 6 pm Sunday, November 12 - and that you guard this time as you would guard a family vacation that you've driven three hours away to attend. In other words, don't schedule anything overlapping and think about how you might "pack" for such an event.

1. Consider what you would like to "leave behind" when you begin this experience.

- Would you bring your work laptop or papers to correct to a Sabbath retreat?
- What about your cell phone, Facebook, or the laundry?
- Would you want to spend that time away doing your taxes, preparing for your mother's visit, or fretting about a coworker conflict?

A question to ask is: What would feel like a huge relief to leave behind for 24 hours?

2. Consider what you would like to "bring" to this experience.

What activities give you joy or bring you rest? Knitting, napping, drawing or dreaming, reading, or relaxing in the bath? What do you need to do in advance to be ready to follow your heart if the moment arises - a good book? Some new yarn? A puzzle? "Bring" those things to your Sabbath retreat.

Food is part of your day. Would you love a day not to cook? What can you get or do in advance to allow that? Would you love the chance to linger in the kitchen and create a lavish meal? What can you get or do in advance to allow that?

Who in your life will be sharing this experience with you? Children? Spouse? Friends? How can this day be a different kind of day for you all? If you are alone a lot, consider spending part of the day with someone whose company you enjoy. If you're around people a lot, consider finding a pocket of time each person in your house can do something alone, or plan an hour when everyone is quiet together (this CAN work with kids! - we'll talk about how, if you'd like!). If you will be with a partner and/or kids, what do you enjoy doing as a family that you don't often make time to do? What can you look forward to together?

3. When the bus leaves for camp...

The Jewish Sabbath begins right at sundown - not by a time on a clock or by someone's to-do list or when everything is finished and everyone is ready for it. When the sun drops below the horizon, the Sabbath has begun. What's done is done, what is undone remains undone.

The important thing is that everything gets set down, so that space may be opened up within us and between us, to be met by God just as we are.

Sabbath is a day for being, instead of doing.

This means that if the time comes and you have done no preparing, do not worry. Get on the bus anyway - this day will be a blessing to you. It really will! And even if you look ahead and think that while you "intended" to participate, some super important things came up and you simply do not have time, all the more reason you keep to the boundaries of your day set apart. Get on the bus anyway - this day will be a blessing to you. IT RE-ALLY WILL.

Finally, as the day comes to a close on Sunday evening, we will provide you with a closing blessing to mark your transition back to ordinary time. We will also provide a means online for participants to share about their experience with each other for those of you who would enjoy this. We will get you this information (along with a recipe or two) later in the week.

Ancient Jewish sages urged people to count out and speak at least 100 blessings, or statements of gratitude, each day. What would happen if we intentionally listed 100 blessings daily? Can you imagine?!

What if the first blessing we counted was simply the day itself? "Thank you, God, for this brand new day!" "Bless my use of this day, Lord, that I might glorify you." Scripture encourages such awareness and promises an additional blessing in return: "Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12, NIV).



The meeting was called to order by President Steve Kirk at 6:30 PM.

Present: Steve Kirk, Rick McManis, Ken Bobek, Dennis Wellsandt, Dave Helfert, Pastor Jon Pedersen, Nell Pieper,

Tom Gustafson and Phil Sleezer.

Absent: Amber Gayhart

The Council shared personal "highs/lows" and prayed for one another.

Minutes of the September 19 Council meeting were approved prior to the meeting via email.

Pastor's Report (Highlights): Pastor Pedersen presented his monthly report. He highlighted the following:

The food collection to cover the gap in Food Pantry coverage was successful. "Our church stepped up," said Pastor Jon. Over 100 bags of food have been contributed to date. The Food Pantry will reopen in early November. A new emphasis will be restocking the shelves of an empty food pantry.

The initial training for the Visitation Group will take place on October 21. Pastor Pedersen and Tom Redig will lead the training. Thirteen to fourteen people have expressed interest in this new initiative.

A new member class will begin on November 2.

The Synod's annual Discipleship Gathering will take place at First Lutheran Church in Joliet on November 9. Nine people will be making the mission trip to Nicaragua in January.

The weekend of December 23-24 will feature a busy worship schedule. There will be regular (Advent) services on Saturday evening and Sunday morning (10:30). Christmas Eve services will follow at 5:00 and 10:30 pm.

Youth Ministers Report:

Council received the Youth Ministry Coordinator's report from Mike Markwell. It included a schedule of activities through mid December.

The Youth Room refurbishing is almost complete. You are invited to stop by and take a look.

The high school ministry is set to start on November 5. The group will focus on prayer and social justice issues. The first topic this Fall will be "food justice."

Ministry Team Reports:

<u>Communications</u> (Tom Gustafson): The Committee met on Saturday, October 14. Kris Glowczynski and Mike Markwell are working to get our web page moved to a new host/provider by November 1st. Brian Rauworth installed two WiFi repeaters in areas that had weak coverage.

Evangelism/Fellowship and Caring (Amber Gayhart/Rick McManis): No recommendations to Council.

<u>Learning and Youth</u>: (Amber Gayhart/Rick McManis): The Palm Squad will present a Reformation skit during worship on October 22.

Stewardship (Pastor Pedersen): Linda Bunting will lead the November Stewardship emphasis.

Preschool (Nell Pieper): No meeting took place.

<u>Property</u> (Phil Sleezer): (1) The property team finished the job of removing overgrown and unattractive bushes from church property. (2) A quote of \$1,200 (maybe slightly more) for sealing cracks in the parking lot was received. It has not been decided if this work will be done. (3) The toilet in the upstairs men's washroom was replaced. (4) NIR Roof Care submitted a proposal for roof repair at a cost of \$2,200. They also suggested an annual inspection (that would include small repairs) for \$500 per year. The Property Committee will consider these options at their next meeting.

Worship (Pastor Pedersen): No recommendations to Council.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Wellsandt presented a financial report for the month of September. There was a deficit for the month of approximately \$1,500.

Congregational Ministry Teams:

Finance/Audit (Dennis Wellsandt): The Audit Committee met on Monday, 10/16.

On October 21 Treasurer Wellsandt will be attending a treasurer's workshop in Rochelle, IL.

Memorial Gifts (Nell Pieper): The Committee is looking into the different rooms in the church to see if they could use some cleaning or "sprucing up."

Personnel (Ken Bobek): The committee did not meet.

<u>Nominations</u> (Dave Helfert): The Nominating Committee consists of Ken Franz, Fern Kinder and Terry and Carol Ziemke.

The terms of four current Council members will expire at the end of this year. They can, of course, choose to seek another term.

Old Business:

Copies of By-Laws and Constitution: The project has been completed. Updated digital copies have been promised.

<u>Development of new SOTH Mission Statement</u> (Pastor Pedersen and Amber Gayhart): Tabled for a future meeting.

<u>HVAC/Plumbing update</u>: On Wednesday, October 18, a team from the 20/10 Engineering Group was to be at SOTH to begin the project.

New Business:

<u>Building Use Policy</u>: Apparently we do not have a building use policy in writing. We are going to look at the building use polices of other congregations.

<u>2018 budget</u>: Treasurer Dennis Wellsandt provided Council with figures showing income and expenses for the first three quarters of 2017. These figures will be helpful in making decisions for the 2018 budget. The suggested 2018 budget will be finalized at the November Council meeting and presented to the congregation for approval in December.

Council Meeting: The next Council meeting will be on Tuesday, November 21 at 6:30 pm.

Ken Bobek moved for adjournment (2nd by Phil Sleezer). The meeting adjourned at 8:12 and was closed with the Lord's Prayer.




